Mwami-Mchinji One-Stop Border Post to Boost Regional Trade

THE long-awaited Mwami-Mchinji One-Stop Border Post between Zambia and Malawi was finally commissioned on December 7 by presidents Hakainde Hichilema and Lazarus Chakwera following a €5.31 million grant by the European Union (EU).

he aggregate €48 million Trade Facilitation Programme (TFP) is financed under the 11th European Development Fund (11 EDF) with the objective of improving inclusive regional economic growth and enhancing the competitiveness of the COMESA region.

The programme supports the implementation of key pillars of One Stop Border Post (OSBP) operations.

Some of the major activities implemented under the programme include upgrading the customs e-management system and bandwidth; improving inter-agency connectivity; implementation of the Trade and Transport Corridor Management System; capacity-building, training and sensitization of National Trade Facilitation Committee and Border Agencies, among others.

In January, 2021, the COMESA Secretar-

iat and the Government of the Republic of Malawi signed a 3.54 million Euros (€) agreement that sub-delegated the implementation of coordinated border management activities under the broader trade facilitation programme with COMESA at Mchinji border post between Zambia and Malawi on the Malawian side.

The Principal Secretary in the Ministry of Trade, Malawi, Christina Zakeyo,

and COMESA Secretary-General Chileshe Kapwepwe separately signed the sub-delegation agreement in Lilongwe and Lusaka that same month.

Prior to that signing of the sub-delegation agreement, the Zambian Government signed a similar agreement to upgrade its side of the border post at Mwami back on November 27, 2020.

INTEGRATION

Commenting on the commissioning, EU Ambassador Jacek Jankowski, who attended the official launch of the Mwami-Mchinji One-Stop Border Post commended Zambia and Malawi for enhancing regional integration.

The EU envoy cited the completion of the post as a manifestation of COMESA's regional agenda.

"This is yet another milestone in our relations based on the Joint Africa–European Union Strategy principles of ownership, partnership and solidarity. What we are witnessing today is the actualization of the COMESA's regional integration agenda through the concrete steps taken by Zambia and Malawi to facilitate trade between them and among regional partners.

"It is also an example of how COMESA has been honouring, since its creation, its promise to be a driving force for economic integration in Africa. This advance in Trade Facilitation will obviously support the implementation of the African Continental Free Trade Area and determine the success of the Tripartite

Free Trade Area."

He also highlighted the EU's commitment to help COMESA realize the benefits of the regional agenda.

He, however, observed that formal COMESA intra-regional trade remained low at 10 per cent of total trade of the region, as more needed to be done to address trade barriers and accelerate the pace of economic integration in the COMESA region.

And the COMESA Secretary-General expressed confidence that the new facility would expedite the flow of goods and services across the two countries, and lower transaction costs.

"As COMESA, we look forward to a changed environment for travellers

and commercial stakeholders using the Mwami/Mchinji OSBP. Large and small-scale traders alike would now be able efficiently clear merchandise at immensely reduced transaction costs, thereby, be able realize greater sales and increased incomes," said Kapwepwe.

ACCELERATE

In addition, and as part of the Nacala corridor support, the EU also made a €44.8 million contribution for the construction of the Great East Road from the Luangwa Bridge to the Mwami Border.

This is in line with the EU's objective under the Global Gateway to support Africa to accelerate digital transition and sustainable growth and decent job creation.

The Government of the Republic of Zambia had in 2021 received financing from the African Development Bank (AfDB) in various currencies towards the cost of Nacala Road Development Project Phase IV.

It was intended that part of the proceeds of this loan be applied to eligible payments under the Works Contract for the Construction of the Mwami/Mchinji OSBP: Works Package 2: Zambia OSBP facilities, according to the AfDB.

Kansanshi Mining Plc successfully hosted mine rescue response teams from eight companies for a joint training session.

he session held on November 11 drew teams from Konkola Copper Mines, Mopani, NFCA, Lubambe Copper Mines, Nkana, Mabiza, Mufulira and Luanshya who spent an hour underground.

All mine rescue teams in Zambia are





trained through the Zambian Chamber of Mines at various nominated mines on a quarterly basis to expose them to emergency control requirements

The training was coordinated by Eric Cousins who is Kansanshi Mine Safety and Industrial Hygiene Manager with Zambia Mine Rescue executives in attendance.

Although mine rescue response gear, training, and techniques have improved over the past century, miners need upskilling to survive during a disaster.

To this end, underground mine safety teams can help to improve mine rescue response by clearly identifying escape routes, placing rescue stations in key locations, and ensuring there is adequate ventilation.

The main areas that the teams were tested on were: Map reading, emergency procedure adherence, leadership and teamwork, and physical fitness and endurance.

Training consists of the following scenario as a brief to the Mine Rescue Teams who are taken in batches of four:

Workers are leaving the decline work areas at 05:00 hrs in the morning at the end of shift. An electrical substation explodes causing a fire and power cut underground

Workers then have to be rushed to the surface due to the nature of the event.

Access to the entry of the mine is filled with smoke but there are three missing workers that need to be rescued.

The Kansanshi Mine Management team was led by Kansanshi Mining Plc General Manager Anthony Mukutuma, Safety Manager Teza Kasengele and Chief Mining Engineer George Nzoma. Kansanshi Mining Plc General Manager Anthony Mukutuma thanked the mine rescue teams for taking their time, showing commitment and passion for saving people's lives and for show-casing their skills.

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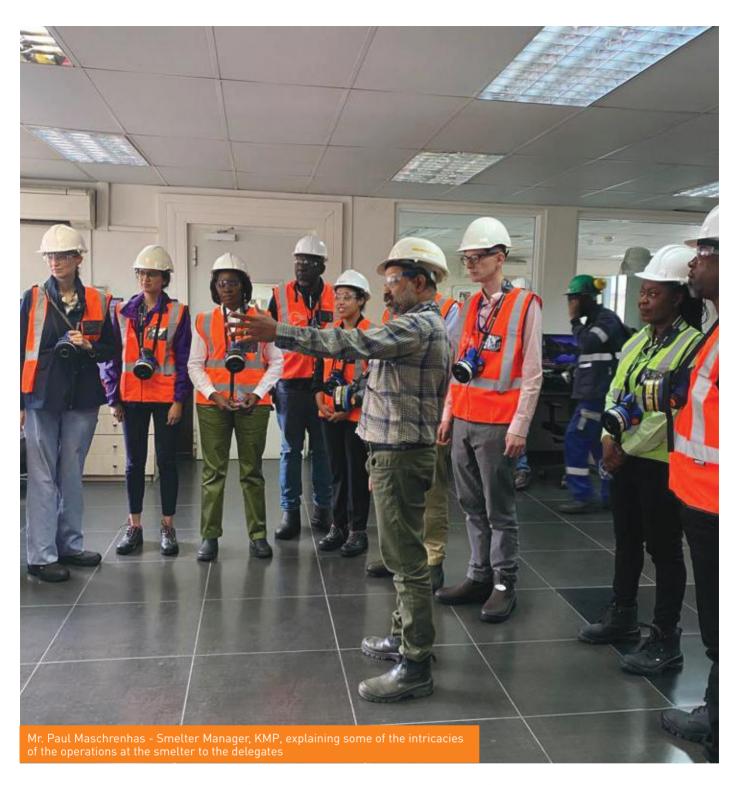

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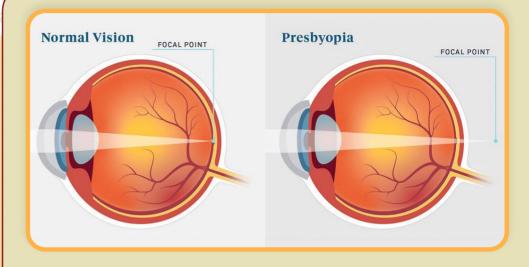

SYMPTOMS

Presbyopia is caused by changes in the lens inside the eye. As people age, the lens becomes harder and less elastic, making it more difficult for the eye to focus on close objects.

TREATMENT OPTIONS FOR PRESBYOPIA

There's no cure for presbyopia. Treatment consists of wearing eyeglasses or contact lenses, or possibly getting a corrective surgery. Several types of eyeglasses are available for presbyopia, including:

Reading glasses

These are worn only when reading or doing close-up work.

Office progressives

You'll also generally only wear these for reading or using a computer and remove them when you're out and about.

These glasses correct your distance vision when you look through them at eye level, and they correct your near vision when looking through the lower part of the lens.

Progressive multifocals

These glasses have corrections for near, middle, and far vision.

PREVENTION OF PRESBYOPIA

Presbyopia isn't considered a disease — it's a natural part of aging that affects the eye. That means there's no way to prevent presbyopia. But there are steps you can take to keep your eyes healthy and prevent other more serious eye problems, like macular degeneration:

- · Reduce eyestrain by keeping your home and workplace well-lit.
- · Get regular eye exams to make sure your prescription is up-to-date and to look for signs of other eye conditions.
- · Wear sunglasses to protect your eyes from damaging ultraviolet (UV) rays.
- Support your overall health by eating a balanced diet that's rich in vitamins A, C, E, and
- · Limit alcohol.
- · Exercise regularly.
- · Don't smoke.
- · Control chronic conditions like diabetes and high blood pressure. Left untreated, they can impact your vision.
- · See your doctor right away if you have double vision, see flashes of light or black spots, have suddenly blurry vision, or suddenly lose vision in one eye, as these symptoms may indicate a serious condition.

Dr Phiri was speaking on October 28 in the presence of Premium School Executive Director Grace Mshanga, Dean of the UNZA School of Medicine Dr Elliot Kafumukache, Luanshya District Commissioner Onesimus Ngonomo, Luanshya Mayor Charles Mulenga, Pre-



mium School Board Chairman Charles Kachikoti, Premium School Head Principal Robert Chisupa, Nursing and Midwifery Council of Zambia (NMCZ) Kitwe Inspector Beatrice Mwewa, Roan School of Nursing Representative Rose Kangomu and Apostle Dr Aaron Mwale.

Dr Phiri was accompanied by his wife Dr Antoinette Chileshe Phiri who is Executive Director of Carewell Oasis Medical Services in Kitwe.

The Guest of Honour recalled that the first graduation in 2020 saw 40 students graduate, being eight nurses and 32 clinical officers; while the second graduation last year had 89 graduates with 52 nurses and 37 clinical officers.

Urging the graduates to study to show themselves approved according to Scripture, Dr Kafumukache said it was very costly and very exacting to train medical staff. As such the graduates should be ever willing to learn.

"Our patients see us as 'Gods'. They take our words as Gospel truth. In other words, we must be careful with the words we speak to our own patients. The fact that someone has a particular illness doesn't mean you tell them they will die, or there is no hope."

Dr Phiri, also Overseer of the Oasis of Love Ministries International in Kitwe, quoted Colossians 4:6 which states, "Let your speech always be with grace, seasoned with salt, that you may know how you ought to answer each one."

CONSULT

Dr Phiri encouraged them to consult seniors and consultants, but recognize



that the most important consultant was God, the Great Physician without whom there was no healing.

"Listen even to that cleaner who has been there twenty years; they may tell you something that will save life." He added that patients were human beings, not mere files or documents. Each person was special in their own right.

Dr Kafumukache observed that life starts from the seed of the man, but these days abortions were carried out by medical practitioners. "This has diluted the Hippocratic Oath. We need to get back to preserving life."

He counselled the graduates to cherish

their country of birth as the best place to be. "It is not by chance you are here; God placed you here. This is where you should run your race."

Dr Kafumukache said while technology was useful, nurses and clinical officers could not be trained virtually. There was need for the learning process to frequently handle patients and touch them to differentiate between soft tissue and hard body parts.

Urging the graduates to study to show themselves approved according to Scripture, Dr Kafumukache said it was very costly and very exacting to train medical staff. As such the graduates should be ever willing to learn.

"If the nurse fails; the clinical officer fails. This lowers and tarnishes all medical professionals. Go and make the mark just as your lecturers made the mark."

POSITIVE ATTITUDE

NMCZ Inspector Beatrice Mwewa called for a positive attitude among health care providers. "You are expected to exhibit a positive attitude in the provision of care each and every time you are in contact with clients and patients. Demonstrate the highest level of respect, courtesy, care and honesty to your clients and patience."

She said professionalism was expected of the graduates in the field. "Zambians are waiting to be treated with the highest professional and ethical standards that you have acquired during your training. You are expected to uphold the professional standards by giving love, compassion and care to the clients entrusted to you."

Mwewa pressed her audience for competence, care and cleanliness as principles of health care delivery in all health facilities. "You have just started your professional journey as a nurse. I would like to encourage you to set your priorities right as nursing requires constant updating yourself with the latest knowledge and information."

She told student nurses still in training to assess their individual performance "and focus on where you need to be from where you are. Keep your eyes on your goal and refuse to be distracted until you have attained the reward."

Mayor Charles Mulenga was delighted that Premium School graduates were heading for the professional world with unique skills and abilities. The mayor saluted Premium School for its accomplishments, and looked forward to seeing it transform towards into a university. The college has introduced an abridged nursing programme and other short courses.

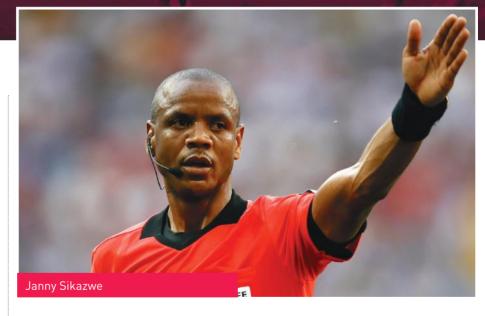

anny Sikazwe, Zambia's topnotch Federation International Football Association (FIFA) referee and Saudi Arabia's national team coach Frenchman Herve Renard are among the reasons.

Sikazwe, being Zambia's first and only Zambian referee to officiate at the highest football showpiece, carries the 'prefix' of 'Zambian Referee' each time commentators, analysts and writers make reference to him.

He was at the centre of the pitch during the match between Belgium and Canada, taking full control, making split-second accurate decisions throughout the encounter.

Sikazwe, a teacher by profession, was not shy to make the correct decisions, awarding Canada a penalty in the 11th minute after consulting Video Assistant Referee (VAR) and giving cautions whenever necessary. He continues to play a part in the matches, though behind the scenes.

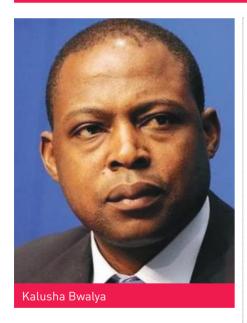

Interestingly, it was with similar motivation lines that Renard speaks in one of the advertisements that is still running on Zambian television screens while donning his traditional white shirt.

Fondly referred to as 'mulamu' (brother-in-law), being father to a Zambian girl and once declared freeman of Lusaka, Renard has never hidden his attachment to Zambia.

"I have a Zambian tattoo inside my heart, I am always sad whenever Chipolopolo is absent at AFCON," Renard once said.

One of the players from the 2012 African Championship crop who is now retired defender, Nyambe Mulenga, is all praises for Renard whom he says motivated him and the team beyond expectation.

"That man (Renard) is one of the best football coaches in the World. I still remember how he sat me down and told me how I was to handle Ivory Coast's deadly winger Gervinho in that encounter; and I managed to do that," Mulenga recalls.

ANALYST

Former Football Association of Zambia (FAZ) President and soccer icon Kalusha Bwalya is also participating in the World Cup, but as an analyst from his base in South Africa.

Kalusha, with his wealth of knowledge in football is one of the experts that Super-Sport has assembled to give expert analysis of the matches played from Qatar.

Like he was referred to during his footballing career, Kalusha too carries a Zambian tag wherever he shows up.

Zambia National Broadcasting Corporation (ZNBC) Television also took part by showing some games live, while Radio One brought it even closer home with running commentaries in local languages.

COMMENTARIES

ZNBC sports presenter Matimba Nkonje, also Supersport presenter and commentator is yet another Zambian actively involved in commentaries at theQatar World Cup games.

Those who have followed Matimba would remember that he too, has had such engagements at the world stage before.

There are, however other Zambians who are in Qatar in their individual capacity to watch matches while donning the national colours in scarf and other clothing.

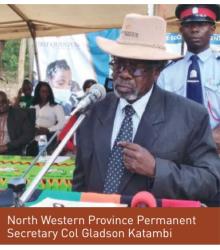
The Expo attracted seed marketing companies, agriculture equipment suppliers and the surrounding community.

backgrounds, meaning we have children from the schools that we support as well as an orphanage; and those from other schools who have just developed an interest in golf.

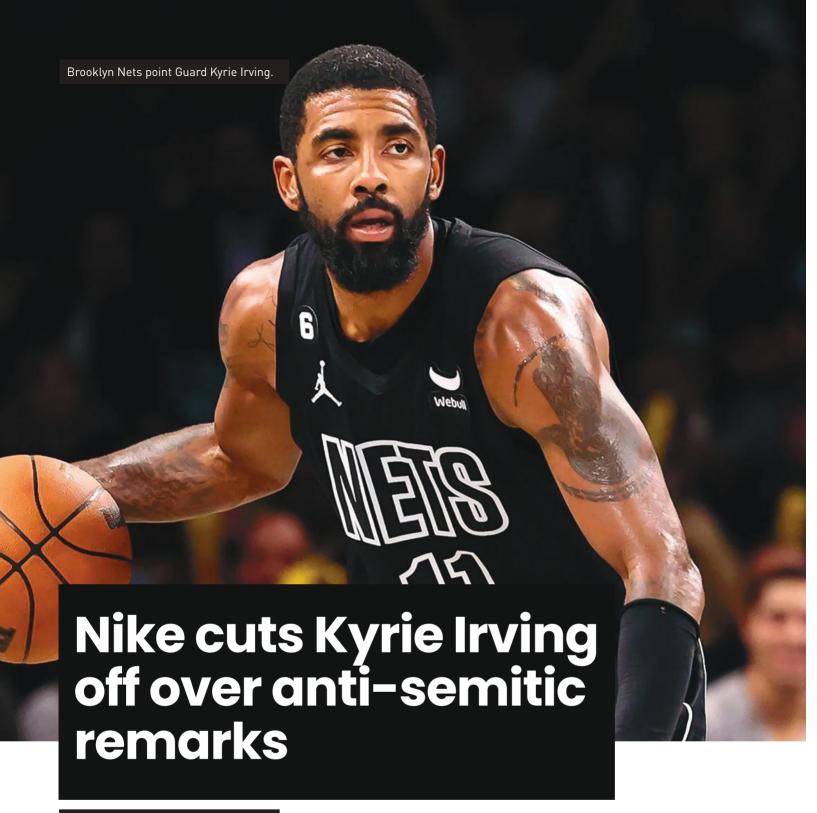
"So what we are trying to show is inclusion and diversity by including a wide range of children in the tournament," said Chitoshi.

The National Basketball Association's projected hall of fame point guard Kyrie Irving has lost a partnership with Nike over an alleged antisemitic social media post.

Nike spokesperson told NPR that "Kyrie is no longer a Nike athlete," officially ending the endorsement agreement that was scheduled to expire on October 1, 2023.

The social media post that set social me-

dia and the corporate world ablaze was a documentary called Hebrews to Negroes: Wake Up Black America, which is based on Ronald Dalton's book series of the same name which aims to prove the Black Hebrew Israelites belief that certain people of colour, including Black Americans, are the true descendants of the biblical Israelites.

After a five-game suspension, Kyrie Irving resumed playing with the Brooklyn Nets on November 20 following up an apology to the Jewish community and admitting that he did not handle the situation well.

In a post on his Instagram account, Irving apologised for tweeting the documentary.

"To all Jewish families and communities that are hurt and affected from my



post, I am deeply sorry to have caused you pain, and I apologise," he wrote. "I initially reacted out of emotion to being unjustly labelled Anti-Semitic, instead of focusing on the healing process of my Jewish brothers and sisters that were hurt from the hateful remarks made in the documentary."

The decision to terminate Kyrie Irving's contract followed Nike's rival Adidas' decision to drop Kanye West after what was labelled as an 'anti-semitic rant,' costing him \$2 billion in a day. Kanye West accounted for 7 percent of Adidas' revenue and their collaboration brought relevance to the Adidas brand, but the sportswear giant kept their decision to completely terminate their alliance.

Kyrie Irving's anti-semitic remarks are dubbed as 'alleged' in this article because they are not as blatant as American rapper Kanye West's comments on a podcast called Drink Champs.

After Kanye West expressed how the Jews controlled the media and all major corporations, West proceeded to say "I can say anti-semitic things and Adidas can't drop me, now what?" The episode featuring the Grammy award-winning artist was later on removed by Revolt TV and its host N.O.R.E apologised by saying "I had no idea that he was going to speak on those things."

Coming to Kyrie Irvings defence, Minister Louis Farrakhan who is the leader

of the nation of Islam said that Kyrie is "searching for himself... he is searching for who he is and who he belongs to and what his root is in this world."

Minister Farrakahn also said that the same people persecuting him are the same people that took away from him and from 'us' (referring to black Americans) the knowledge of self.

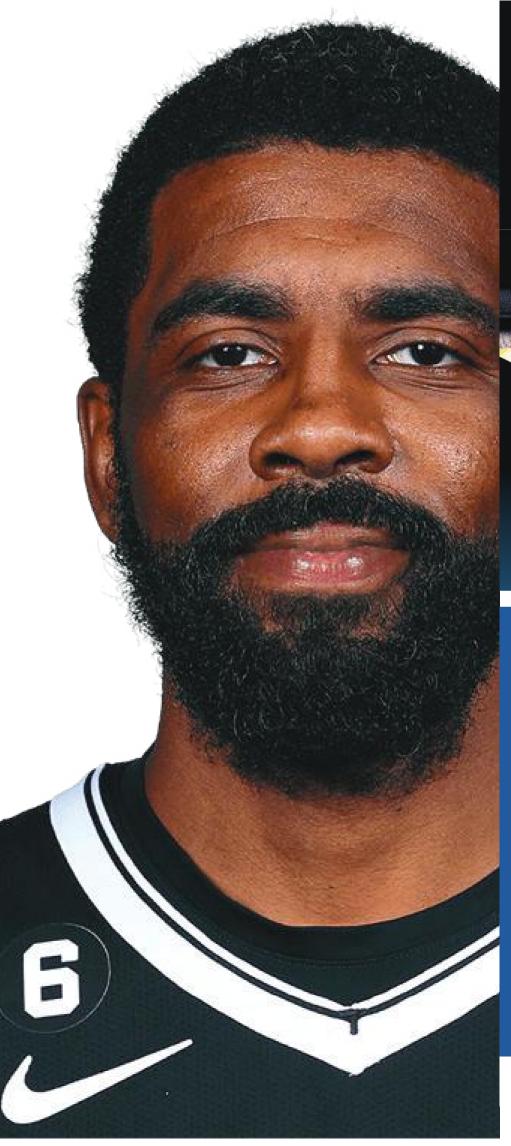

"But it seems like to me that the whole Jerry Jones situation, the photo, and I know it was years and years ago, and we all make mistakes, I get it. It seems like it's just been buried under, like, 'Oh, it happened. OK. We just move on.' And I was just kind of disappointed that I haven't received that question from you guys."

Consistency elevates body hygiene products agent

Mary Mpongo from Solwezi's Kandundu extension area is one among many Zambians cashingin on her trade and distribution of Longrich hygiene (body) products.

t 64 years of age, Mpongo against all odds is an agent of Longrich, a renowned Chinese manufacturer of products such as soaps, panty liners, pads, and mouth fresheners among others.

"I paid K1,500 to become a distributor and this qualified me to get products on wholesale to resale at a profit. I supply small packets of soap (Eva brand) to some lodges here in Solwezi for use in their rooms," Mpongo says.

For a K350 box of soap that contains 200 tablets, Mpongo says her cash flow has improved as most of her clients pay on cash basis while others pay within a week. On average, she sells 10 boxes every month.

Since January 2021 when she launched out, armed with a K5000 as her initial capital, Mpongo has seen her business grow to its present value of K8000.

Mpongo discloses that her cash flow has improved because of sound financial management principles she learnt in 2019 during the business training course courtesy of the Kansanshi Mining Plc (KMP) and Fortune World Investments Limited.

"I did all the 24 topics and after that, I began to follow the training on the radio. The knowledge from the training has helped me to mature, employ finan-



cial discipline, bank all the proceeds on a daily basis, keep time and care for

a daily basis, keep time a customers."

Mpongo further hints that her record-keeping skills helps her determine the number of items sold amid business expenses, as well as to measure the business performance and the rate of growth.

Despite the fact that dealing in Longrich products is a lucrative venture, the unstable dollar exchange rate fluctuates, hence affecting imports of her products from Tanzania where she uses an agent who procures and send the cargo through logistics companies.

"On average, I make about 80 per cent profit margin and my future plans are to increase product range and stock for greater volume sales. If all goes well in future, my business is projected to be worth over K30,000."

Mpongo belongs to an association called Mbunda Royal Establishments in Kabompo District, and explains that the 10-member group owns extensive tracts of land where fundraising activities include beekeeping, fish ponds and crop farming.

"I have started the process of formalizing my business in fulfillment of the business training objectives. Thank you KMP for teaching the communities how to grow their businesses," she added.

The Fortune World mentoring team led by its Managing Director Mukumbi Kafuta were pleased that Mpongo is able to fervently put what she was taught into practice.

"I urge your group to apply for Constituency Development Fund (CDF) and also formalize your business by coming up with a business plan," Kafuta said.

Kayombo: Growing business in all directions

At Mafo Kayombo is a rare breed of small entrepreneurs who in May 2021 opened two schools in Solwezi alongside his real estates agency, driving school and natural food supplies.



t the Mafo preschool and primary school in Kazomba of Solwezi, Kayombo has enrolled more than 90 children. His other school in Kyawama has 143 pupils and four teachers.

"I got recruited for the training in January 2021 and at this time, I was not doing much except running a small barbershop. But the training helped me to start thinking big and has led me to having tangible investments that are bringing better returns," he says.

Kayombo discloses that topics such as Identifying Market Opportunities helped him open his mind for greater business ideas.

"I started the school business in May 2021 after attending the Kansanshi Mining Plc-sponsored Fortune world business training. The idea of starting a school was inspired by the training I recently acquired."

The young proprietor said his pupils pay K300 kwacha per term and five teachers have been employed permanently at the one-class-per-grade school.

Kayombo rents the school building at K1,800 and makes about K10,000 in terms of revenue with about K4000 in monthly profit.

He noted that thanks to the knowledge he acquired, his business is registered with PACRA, and the Ministry of Education came to inspect and gave advice to have the windows placed for better ventilation in classroom blocks.

Apart from running both schools, Kayombo explains that he is also a real estate agent and supplier of natural foods.

"Real estate business is lucrative with commission sold for every house at 10 per cent of the house sales value. With constant sales of houses, this business has a turnover of K50,000 per month especially that the area I live in (Kazomba) lacks a trades school and is looked at as one of the gaps of the community which is good to invest in," Kayombo states.

With his driving school business plan already in place, Kayombo hinted that

fees will be as follows; Class C1 will be at K2000 for 21 days while Class B will be pegged at K1,200 for 21 days.

He narrated that the driving school is very lucrative because it has less overheads and the training period is not lengthy.

"I have two instructors here who I have already identified. We will be paid K2,500 per month each. My idea of a driving school also came up after attending the KMP-sponsored training," he affirmed.

He thanked KMP for the knowledge acquired as it would take him far in life. He urged supporters to continue helping the community so that more people in the community can benefit from the same privileges he enjoyed.

Kayombo has equally applied for Constituency Development Fund (CDF) for his driving school to a tune of K100,000 to buy a light truck.

The Fortune World mentoring team led by its Managing Director Mukumbi Kafuta urged Kayombo to reinvest in the business to make it grow and was encouraged to affiliate his businesses to the North-West Chamber of Commerce.

In a bid to diversify his business, Kayombo considers having an agro shop as another opportunity which he would use to service the large farming population in the area.

"I have also registered a driving school in my area and am working on identifying a partner who can invest in a class C vehicle for now. This school would train drivers that will be licensed and prepare them for possible employment in the public or private sector," he noted.

"The training has helped me in terms of managing money properly and being able to reinvest in business for sustainability. Due to the training, I was inspired to invest in a fish pond but the fish was washed away by the rains due to poor pond banks which succumbed to pressure," she narrated.

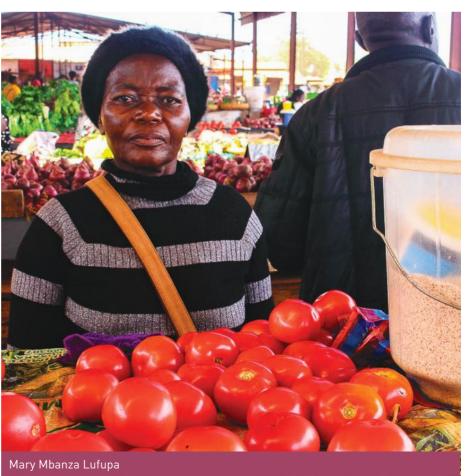
She disclosed that her capital has now grown to over K1000 due to good financial practices and that her vision is to enlarge the poultry house to accommodate over 250 birds.

In 2015, the Kansanshi Foundation used to give her and her colleagues 25 chicks and feed to raise these birds for sale, adding that the capital raised through this grant is in use till this date.

"I have put the poutry business on hold and will resume latter this year with 150 chickens," Lufupa stated.

She thanked KMP for the training and the grant which had empowered her permanently as her capital for the poultry business project is now at K3000.







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
